
You invest a lot of time and energy into getting the right content on the website, anticipating prospect questions, and ensuring that content is thorough enough for those prospects who want to self serve without ever picking up the phone to chat with a recruitment advisor. We think most of our members have the right content *somewhere* on their website for all motivational segments, but students have a hard time finding the content that answers their motivation-driven questions. This tool provides a model for bringing question-answering content to the surface on the home page: hyper-organized FAQs. Though not novel, FAQs present content in a way that is easy for prospects to pick out the information most relevant to their motivation for returning to school.

Link FAQs (and Explanation) to Home Page

After reviewing hundreds of adult education and continuing education websites, we found that FAQs are rich with information and one of the easiest ways to navigate to highest priority information. Because most members struggle to help prospects navigate their website painlessly and quickly (i.e., finding motivation-appropriate information within a few clicks), this tool offers a model for structuring your FAQs so that they 1) are findable within a few clicks and 2) cater to motivation-appropriate questions.







FAQs present an opportunity to cite job demand and changes in skills required by employers. For example, to add credibility, Norwich University cites in its "Civil Engineering FAQs a report published by the National Academy of Engineering. This type of information is appropriate for the Why This Specific Master's Program?" category.

FAQs also allow for links to in-depth information on curriculum.



Why This Specific Master's Program is an opportunity to describe the personality of the program and to showcase variety of students. Caters to all prospect segments.




