
## **Demographics Trends**

#### Recruitment Pool Set to Shrink in the Next Decade

Enrollment of four-year college-going students will steadily decrease between 2020 and 2029 (36% decline in less than a decade).

# Forecasted Number of College-Aged and College-Bound Students in Arkansas (Thousands), by Year of High School Graduation


-35% Decline in four-year collegegoing students between 2017 and 2029



## Students from All Races/Ethnicities Declining Except Asian Americans

The greatest decline will be seen among Non-Hispanic White students (a decrease of 2,500 students between 2017 and 2029), followed by declines in Non-Hispanic Blacks and Hispanics.

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## Affordability Trends

#### Higher Proportion of Low-Income Households

57% of Arkansas's households make less than \$50,000 per year compared to 46% nationally in the same income category. Similarly, Arkansas has a smaller proportion of wealthy households making over \$100,000 per annum.

#### AR Public Institutions Less Affordable Than Most States'

The average net price at Arkansas' public institutions is 26% of the state's median household income, making it one of the less economical states to enroll in public education in the United States.


#### AR Private Institutions Less Affordable

Similarly, the average net price at private institutions as a percentage of median household income is higher than 62% of US states.


#### **Less Debt Among Graduates**

Fewer college graduates are in debt in Arkansas compared to the rest of the country. Average debt per borrower is also slightly lower than the average US borrower's debt.


### Number of Households by Income Segment (Thousands), 2016


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## Funding and Appropriations Trends

#### Reliance on Net Tuition Increased Post-Recession

Net tuition is now nearly half of Arkansas's total educational revenues, an increase of 12 percentage points since 2007.


### Net Tuition as a Portion of Total Education Revenues, per Student FTE

Arkansas's educational appropriations have decreased slightly over the last decade and now stand in between regional and national averages.


# Educational Appropriations per Student FTE in AR, Regionally $^{\rm 1}$ and Nationally, 2007-2017



## Larger Proportion of Tax Revenues Allocated to Higher Education

Arkansas allocates 9% of its tax revenues to higher education – a higher proportion than more than 80% of states in the United States.
