Accreditors

- Council on Occupational Education (COE)
 - o <u>Guidance on distance education</u>, including council approval requirements
- Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET)
 - o Permits temporary modification of program delivery methods

Responding When Your Hands Are Tied

Take Decisive Steps to Safeguard Students

Develop Alternatives



Communicate Broadly

Offer Flexibility to Ease Concerns

- Offer students extended, penalty-free opportunities to make up lost coursework (e.g., IP—in progress grade—gives students one year to complete technical requirement)
- Offer flexible scheduling and extended hours
- Promote off-campus educational opportunities and provide students opportunities to continue learning and mastering their skills
- Consider providing access to other online courses and programs at the college

Provide Detailed Guidance

- Explain why students are unable to complete their class and how the college assessed that decision
- Clarify what students are unable to complete and how that affects their experience (e.g., time to degree, certification)
- Provide the status of testing requirements and updates to testing

Three Ways Institutions are Delivering Value in Hands-On Courses

Culinary Courses

North Idaho College

- Returned lab fees so students can purchase ingredients
- · Faculty and students use their cell phones to record and present their cooking
- Consider coordinating with your campus food pantry to provide a hot meal cooked by culinary students

Nursing

- Offering clinical simulations with Kaplan and Swift River
- Meet the 50% simulation course limit set by state board of nursing
- Students practice real life scenarios through patient care simulations

STFM Lab

VIRGINIA TECH.

- · Uses crowdsourced resources to teach vertebrate morphology course
- Students examine specimens in online **700m** sessions
- · Students virtually share bones found in nature and the class works to identify the animal

CTE

- Joliet Junior College ice carving
- Centennial College <u>baking</u> and <u>pastry arts management</u>
- George Brown College <u>culinary school</u>
- IYRS School of Technology & Trades in Rhode Island digital modeling and fabrication, marine systems, and boat building and restoration
- Toronto's Canadian College of <u>Massage</u> and Hydrotherapy
- St. Paul College considering outdoor CTE courses

Labs

- Touro's Lander College for Women <u>Genetics</u> <u>Immunology Lab</u>
- North Idaho College natural science labs—98% remote

Practicums

- Lethbridge College <u>Early</u> <u>Childhood Education</u>
- George Brown College <u>Early</u> <u>Childhood Education</u>

Partnerships

- California community colleges <u>partnering with Labster</u> to run virtual labs
- Pima Medical Institute, in conjunction with Kaiser Permanente and the SEIU-United Healthcare Workers West union, offering online nursing course to provide California nurses additional training on treating coronavirus patients.


