Pandemic Recovery

Given the severity of pandemicenrollment declines, it's unsurpri that quick-win retention tactics highly. But lower scores for topic related to early pandemic conce virtual advising and support ser and student social (dis)engagen indicate we're getting past the crisis mode of the last 2 years.

Data-Informed Support

Leaders' focus on using data to inform student support also shone through, with success metrics and accountability receiving the highest interest and **disaggregated data to** support equity and dashboards and visualization also scoring highly.

Supporting the Whole Student

The last two years amplified much-needed dialog about mental health, equity, and identity in higher ed. These topics remain top-of-mind for success leaders, who prioritized alerts, interventions, and support for different groups of students highly, and also indicated interest in student community and belonging, and student mental health.

To answer that, each year EAB surveys success leaders at our partner colleges and universities about their priorities and challenges, and the results guide our student success research. This year, 240 leaders across the public, private, 2-year, and 4-year sectors responded to the survey.
