Missing a Pivotal Moment

Pivotal Moments that students commonly miss

- Completing financial aid paperwork
- Clearing registration holds
- Addressing early alerts from faculty or staff

Underlying problem

Students struggle to know which milestones are important as they sort through the high volume of college requirements and communications.

Solutions

Elevate important Pivotal Moments to your students above other campus communications.

Struggling to Make Decisions at a Pivotal Moment

Pivotal Moments that students lack context for

- Withdrawing from a course
- Delaying their major declaration
- Visiting faculty during office hours

Underlying problem

Students lack necessary context for why the choices they make at Pivotal Moments matter and how these choices could impact their college journey later on.

Solutions

Give students insight into the short- and long-term consequences of their decisions.

Stumbling at a Pivotal Moment



Pivotal Moments that students struggle to recover from

- Being placed on academic probation
- Being denied admission to a competitive major
- Failing a required class

Underlying problem

When students experience setbacks at crucial Pivotal Moments, their sense of belonging and self-confidence may deteriorate.



Reassure students that they are capable of succeeding, and outline the steps they need to get back on track.
